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FAQs about careers in the psychological professions

This page has some frequently asked questions about careers in the psychological professions.

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What careers are there in the psychological therapies?

There are lots of career options to choose from in the psychological professions. Different areas of expertise are needed in different counselling and psychotherapist roles, or you could work as a CBT therapist, in one of the psychologist roles or in a practitioner role supporting children and young people. If you have lived experience of mental health challenges, being a peer support worker [1] could be right for you. See what you could do [2].

How and where can I train to be a psychotherapist?

Most staff in the NHS that provide psychotherapy are clinically qualified healthcare professionals, such as <u>psychiatrists</u> [3], <u>clinical psychologists</u> [4], <u>social workers</u> [5] or <u>art</u> [6], <u>music</u> [7] or <u>dramatherapists</u> [8] who have undergone appropriate training.

Is there NHS funding for postgraduate psychology training?

The NHS employs <u>clinical</u> [4], <u>counselling</u> [12], <u>forensic</u> [13] and <u>health</u> [14] psychologists. The training and financial support is different for each. The NHS usually supports a number of students on approved postgraduate clinical psychology courses, whereas students on other courses usually self-fund. However, it is always worth checking with employers and course providers directly.

The NHS offers a limited number of child psychotherapy training posts which are offered by a small number of NHS trusts, or as a partnership between an NHS trust and one of the training providers. These posts provide varying levels of financial support for trainees, in exchange for clinical practice, usually undertaken at an NHS site. What is the NHS Talking Therapies service (previously Improving Access to Psychological Therapies - IAPT) and what sort of careers are there in this field?

NHS Talking Therapies provide greater public access to the talking therapies. Specifically, within this service there are opportunities to train as <u>psychological wellbeing practitioners</u> [16] and <u>high intensity therapists</u> [17].

However, if you like the idea of using the talking therapies, you might also want to look at opportunities for working as a <u>counsellor</u> [19], <u>psychotherapist</u> [20], <u>psychiatrist</u> [3], <u>clinical</u> <u>psychologist</u> [4], <u>social worker</u> [5], <u>mental health nurse</u> [21], or <u>occupational therapist</u> [22].

My degree isn't in psychology, Can I still become a clinical, counselling, health or forensic psychologist?

If your degree isn't in psychology, you can study for an approved conversion course which will give you eligibility for Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership of the British Psychological Society (BPS). This membership then allows you to apply for postgraduate courses in clinical, counselling, health or forensic psychology

How do I train to work as a counsellor in the NHS?
