Who works in the wider healthcare team?

There are lots of different roles in the wider healthcare team, including <u>administration</u> [1], <u>clinical support staff</u> [2], <u>corporate services</u> [3], <u>domestic services</u> [4], <u>estates services</u> [5] and <u>support services</u> [6].

What do I need and where can I train as a healthcare assistant (HCA)?

You don't usually need any formal qualifications or training to apply for <u>healthcare assistant</u> [8] posts in the NHS. Some relevant care experience, such as volunteering, can be really helpful.

NHS organisations in England and Wales advertise their vacancies on the NHS Jobs website [9].

To find out what sort of qualifications, skills and experience are required, have a look at the person specification for each vacancy. This will give you the details you'll need to decide whether you have what is needed already, or need to do something else first.

What cadet schemes are available in the NHS?

It really depends on where you live as to what is on offer. Cadet schemes may still exist in some parts of the country, but most have been replaced by apprenticeships.

How can I train as a phlebotomist?

To train as a <u>phlebotomist</u> [11], you will usually need to be employed in an appropriate role in the NHS eg as a <u>healthcare assistant</u> [8] or <u>healthcare science assistant/associate</u> [12] and your employer will support you to do a part-time course in phlebotomy/venepuncture, while you are working.

What qualifications do I need for administrative posts in the NHS?

There are various roles in administration in the NHS, including medical secretary [13] and receptionist [14], as well as, those in finance [15], communications/public relations [16] and human resources [17], for example. There are also opportunities in management.

Some roles will require academic qualifications, such as GCSEs, or an equivalent level 2 vocational qualification. Others may require a degree or professional qualifications, such as in accountancy or human resources.

The NHS usually supports staff to develop their career further, so you may start at a more junior level and work your way into more senior positions with greater responsibility.

Many NHS organisations also offer <u>apprenticeships</u> [10] in administration. To find current apprenticeship opportunities in the NHS, visit the <u>NHS Jobs</u> [9] and <u>National Apprenticeships</u> [18] websites.

How do I become a health play specialist?

You'll need to take a foundation degree with the health play specialism.

Where can I find assistant practitioner courses?

You need to be employed by the NHS in order to be able to access courses and training relevant to the role of an <u>assistant practitioner</u> [20]. You'll usually need experience of working in a relevant support role at a fairly senior level. So if you are applying for a vacancy as an <u>assistant practitioner</u> [20], you will need to make sure that you meet the criteria contained in the person specification for the post before applying.
