Entry requirements

To become a registered nurse, you'll need to study for a degree level qualification in nursing. For a full-time course you'll typically need a minimum of five GCSEs at grade 4-9/C or above plus two or three A-levels or equivalent qualifications at level 3. Nursing degree apprenticeships are also available. [2]



Training

District nurses are registered nurses who've undertaken further training at degree, post graduate certificate or masters level. Full-time training is normally one academic year [3]




Skills and qualities needed
