Entry requirements

To become a registered nurse, you'll need to study for a nursing degree. You'll typically need a minimum of five GCSEs at grade C or above (usually in English and science) plus two or three A-levels or equivalent qualifications at level 3 [2]



Training

District nurses are registered nurses who've undertaken further training at degree, post graduate certificate or masters level. Full-time training is normally one academic year [3]



Health Education England plans to commission 498 district nurse training places in 2016/17 [5]




Skills and qualities needed
